

# Meet the Trustees and NAOs Freelancers

## JENN HALL - CHAIR



Jenn Hall is Head of National Support Services with Alzheimer Scotland. Jenn has worked in a range of Social Care settings for over 20 years and is deeply passionate about the work she gets to do with Alzheimer Scotland. This is particularly due to personal experience of caring for her Grandmother who had Alzheimer's Disease. Jenn is in a senior leadership role responsible for leading and developing Alzheimer Scotland's 24hr Dementia Helpline, National Counselling Service, Action on Rights team and our Active Voice policy and campaigning work.

Jenn recently graduated with Merit, an MSc in Human Rights, Citizenship and Civil Society from Glasgow Caledonian University. Jenn has a particular interest in equality and social justice issues. In 2015 Jenn led on creating the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender (LGBT) Champions Network within AlzScot and has worked hard to increase the visibility and representation of diverse groups within Alzheimer Scotland. Jenn believes fundamentally in applying a human rights based approach to all areas of her practice and is strong advocate for ensuring the rights of people living with dementia and their carers are at the forefront of everything we do. ## KEITH PARK - VICE CHAIR

Keith is Interim Director for Scotland at the MS Society. He has been advocating for people affected by MS for over 10 years in a variety of roles.

In his time as Policy, Public Affairs and Campaigns manager at the MS Society he has led campaigns to increase MS Nurse provision, improve access to new treatments such as HSCT and to make the eligibility criteria used to decide Adult Disability Payment fairer by scrapping the 20 metre and 50% rules. In the past few years Keith has provided leadership and support to the NAOs policy Group. He also Chaired the Mental Health Sub-Group and co-authored the Recommendations for better mental health support for those with neurological conditions.

Keith also has vast experience in the Health and Social Care field having worked in both prior to joining the MS Society.



## IAIN MCWHIRTER - TREASURER



Iain was appointed as CEO at Revive MS Support in April 2022. Revive is based in Glasgow, and provides services and support to people affected by multiple sclerosis to help them manage the physical, emotional, and financial impacts associated with the condition.

Prior to that Iain was Head of Fundraising at MND Scotland for 15 years, leading significant growth in income and awareness, with a spell as Interim CEO in 2021.

Iain is currently a Trustee of the Neurological Alliance of Scotland, and also Treasurer for BOOM! Community Arts, a charity delivering community arts projects in North Glasgow that Iain helped establish in 2017.

## EWAN DALE

A patient for 30+ years, Ewan is a long-serving trustee of both the ME Association and the Neurological Alliance of Scotland. The MEA is a small-to-medium UK charity and he is the main Scottish representative, covering issues affecting the large patient numbers with ME and related conditions. His experiences of health and care services are all too common - some good practice, but mostly poor practice, bad advice and blind resistance to developing effective services. The MEA is involved in pushing for advancement of clinical guidance, medical education and scientific research, for ME and the associated range of post-infectious illnesses, including the largest sub-group of Long Covid patients.



## AVRIL MCLEAN



Avril is the Projects and Participation Senior Practitioner at Action for M.E. and has worked there since 2016. This charity provides services and support for people and families affected by Myalgic Encephalomyelitis (M.E.) across the UK. It also leads the largest research study, Decode ME, in this field. During this time, Avril has worked in different services and projects within the organisation such as Peer Mentoring, Advocacy and Medical Education.

Avril has developed and managed services and volunteers in other areas within the third sector such as older people's services and has volunteered as a Director, Counsellor and Befriender.

## JAMES JOPLING

James has worked almost exclusively in the third sector for the past 28 years, both in Scotland and across the UK. He started his charity career as a volunteer at Oxfam in 1994 and has since worked in organisations such as Cancer Research UK, Breast Cancer Now, Shelter, British Heart Foundation and Samaritans.

Most recently, James was appointed to the position of Director for Scotland at Parkinson's UK in April 2022. He has also been a trustee at HomeStart North Edinburgh and Leith, Social Bite, Scottish Refugee Council and Health in Mind.



## ROISIN EADIE

With over 20 years in journalism (Greenock Telegraph, Scottish Mirror, Daily Record, Sunday Mail) followed by over a decade in communications work, Roisin is driven by a passion to tell people's stories and give them a voice, with a focus on those who are under-represented in terms of policymaking, services and funding, or are misunderstood and overlooked by the wider public.

In her current role as Communications Lead with Scottish Huntington's Association, Roisin led the charity's re-brand, contributed to the development of its five-year Standing Tall strategy, and continues to raise awareness about the disease and the work of Scottish Huntington's Association through media and other awareness raising work.

Prior to joining Scottish Huntington's Association, Roisin was Head of Communications at Mary's Meals UK, a global school feeding charity, and Head of Communications and Public Affairs at Glasgow Caledonian University.



## DAVID MULLIGAN

David is CEO of Funding Neuro, a Glasgow based charity that funds neurological trials with a particular interest in Parkinson's Disease, MND, DIPG and Glioblastoma.

David is a Chartered Accountant with a corporate banking background and has worked across the UK and Europe. David is keen to see more research and trials in the UK and Scotland in particular because too many times great research doesn't get the where it does most good, the patient.

## NICKY COWSILL

Nicky has lived in the Western Isles for over 20 years and was diagnosed with MS in 2013. Nicky is co founder of the charity Neuro Hebrides, supporting people affected by neurological conditions across the Western Isles. She volunteers as part of the coordinating team planning activities and supporting members on a one to one basis. Nicky represents Neuro Hebrides on the Digital Citizen's Panel with the Health & Social Care Alliance Scotland and has also been part of the working groups for the development and roll out the MyNeuroSurvey 2024. Since her diagnosis, Nicky completed a BSc in Sustainable Development with the University of Highlands and Islands with a particular focus on the impacts of climate change on people living with disabilities in island communities



## STEVE PORTELLY

Steve is a patient with two Neurological diagnoses and another two related Neurodevelopmental diagnoses. Steve's father worked as a GP, his mother was a medical secretary (until she was diagnosed with MS), his grandfather was a public health doctor in the Army & grandmother was an Army nurse. These family connections have given Steve an insight into the medical world (with no desire to work in it!).

Steve is now happily retired having worked in the Oil & Gas industry all his working life - private sector - doing a number of roles, progressing to the position of Project Manager. With many qualifications from the "University Of Life", Steve now spends his time trying to help others & giving back something (as much as his conditions and disabilities allow).



## CLAIRE STEVENS

Claire Stevens is currently Chief Executive of Voluntary Health Scotland (VHS), the national network and intermediary for third sector organisations that are working to address health inequalities and make Scotland a healthier and fairer place for everyone. She has held a wide range of executive, non-executive and volunteering roles in Scotland's third and public sectors during a 43 year career, spanning health, welfare rights, homelessness, housing, older people, children and young people, and social action. She is a former Chair of ACOSVO, a founder trustee of Arts Culture Health and Wellbeing Scotland, and was appointed an Honorary Member of the Faculty of Public Health in 2020 for services to public health.

Claire is the sole carer for the person closest to her in her life, who has Parkinson's and Lewy Body dementia, and she has a keen appreciation of the enormous value of the work that neurological charities undertake, both in providing information, services and support, and in carrying out research, campaigning and education.



## DONALD MACPHEE

Donald was diagnosed with Dystonia in 1983 and subsequently set up the Dystonia Society's first ever Scottish self help group and national committee. He later became the Scottish Director, and co-founded the Glasgow Alliance of Neurological Groups (GANG).

Donald has worked in strategic and operational roles for various charities and public sector agencies such as the Wise Group, Kilmarnock College, Unity Enterprise, Scottish Enterprise, Skills Development Scotland and latterly Glasgow City Council (GCC). He retired from GCC in June 2024 but continues as a Board member of two Gaelic community organisations and was appointed by the Scottish Government to the Board of Bòrd na Gàidhlig in 2023.

Donald has contributed to BBC Radio nan Gàidheal programmes for nearly 20 years and in 2022 presented an hour long documentary about his dystonia journey on BBC ALBA. He's also a Spanish speaker and a lifelong sports fan, in particular of football.
